

# **BRIEFING** #9

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### RIDDOR

RIDDOR's trigger point for the reporting of over-three-day injury has increased to over seven days' incapacitation.

Incapacitation is defined as the worker being absent or unable to do work that they would reasonably be expected to do as part of their normal duties.



Reporting of all "Major" injuries still remains a stipulation. This list of Major injuries includes, amongst others, fractures (except fingers etc.), dislocations - shoulder, hip, knee or spine, various losses of consciousness, requirements for resuscitation, illnesses or admittance to hospital arising from various exposures.

In the final quarter of last year we found our expertise called upon in providing asbestos training. This was given to a varied array of clients, from Insurance Companies, through Educational Establishments, to trades people working for Local Authorities. It has been the experience of a number of our clients that although they have covered their Duty to Manage Asbestos, in so far as having all their stock surveyed and having a Management Plan in place, their highest level

of Asbestos incidents arise through contractors not using the Registers correctly or not recognising Asbestos Containing Materials (ACMs).



We have found that education is the final key to minimising the risks from uncontrolled release of fibre from ACMs.
